Milkweed Pods for Monarchs - 2017!



Due to the drastic decline in Monarch butterfly populations, the Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative (OPHI) and local Soil & Water Conservation Districts are again seeking public involvement to collect common and swamp milkweed seed pods from established plants September 1 through October 30. The seeds will be used to establish new plantings and additional habitat for the Monarch butterfly throughout Ohio.

Seed pods from common or swamp milkweed should be collected **ONLY WHEN THE PODS ARE DRY & BROWN-GREY**. If the center seam pops with gentle pressure, they can be picked. It is best to collect pods into paper bags or paper grocery sacks. Avoid using plastic bags because they can allow mold to develop. It is recommended to wear disposable gloves when picking and handling pods. Harvesting seed pods will <u>not</u> have any effect on the population of milkweed in established areas.

The Lucas Soil & Water Conservation District is pleased to serve as a local collection station. Collected dry pods can be

dropped off any day or time during collection period in the designated bins outside the Lucas SWCD office at 130-A West Dudley Street, Maumee, OH 43537. For a list of other SWCDs, visit www.ofswcd.org

Meet the Candidates for Lucas SWCD Board of Supervisors Two to be elected at the Annual Meeting on November 2nd, 2017



Mary Jo Hassen is a 5th generation farmer on a Centennial farm in NW Lucas County that was acquired by her family in 1869. Originally they raised vegetables, grain crops, & livestock. Today she cash rents the farm for grain crops, plus ½ acre where she raises vegetables for market. Mary Jo works for Ohio Seed Improvement Association in Dublin, Ohio. She inspects approximately 3,000 acres annually of certified wheat, weed free straw, oats, spelt, triticale, and soybeans, in NW Ohio & SE Michigan. Her memberships include: Cedar Creek Antique Engine and Tractor Association, Farm Power Club, The Oliver Gang, & Therapy Dogs International Associate Member. Mary Jo has a registered therapy dog named Molly and visits local nursing homes in Ohio, Indiana, & Michigan. She volunteers to collect daily weather data for CoCo-RaHS (Community Collaborative Rain Hail and Snow Network) as well as insect scouting for Ohio State University Extension. As a lifelong member of Lucas County, Mary Jo wishes to bring a wide variety of knowledge of agriculture to the LSWCD Board position.



Dr. Christine M. Mayer is a Professor in the University of Toledo's Department of Environmental Sciences and the Lake Erie Center in Oregon, Ohio. She has been a Lucas SWCD Board Member since 2015. Her research focuses on the ways communities of aquatic organisms in lakes & rivers are shaped by their physical environment. Dr. Mayer strives to help translate research into possible management or conservation actions. She has also worked as an aquaculture extension agent with the U.S. Peace Corps in Togo, West Africa. Dr. Mayer would like to continue to serve the Lucas SWCD as a way to bring her background in science to support decision-making concerning the sound use, management and conservation of Ohio's natural resources and the local community.

Cover Crop Seed Sale

The Lucas Soil & Water Conservation District is offering two **autumn cover crop** seed mixes for use in your backyard garden. LSWCD has partnered with Walnut Creek Seeds to offer cover crop mixes well suited to northwest Ohio.

Why Cover Crops?

Garden Cover Crop Mixes help to reduce erosion and compaction, and increase water permeation in the garden. They also hold minerals normally leached from your soil over the winter. Densely planted cover crops will suppress perennial and winter annual weed growth. The top growth and roots add organic matter to the garden soil. The cover crop's root system also opens passageways that help improve air and water movement and supports microbial life. This microbial life works synergistically with the roots, bacteria and fungi to improve soil health.

At the end of the garden season you may be ready to rest, but your soil is not. All gardens benefit from the use of cover crops, or "green manures" planted at the end of the season. Tilling, weeding, harvesting and foot traffic tends to destroy soil structure. Planting cover crops is an easy way to revitalize the soil.

The advantage of rolling, crushing or using winter kill varieties is to leave the soil surface covered and relatively undisturbed, preventing weeds from growing. In the spring, just plant through and let it act as your mulch. Tilling or pulling is NOT recommended as it destroys root and earthworm pathways, reduces the beneficial microorganism population and oxidizes soil organic matter. You can also harvest the tops for compost.

Garden Late Cover Mix is a simple cover crop mix designed to plant with a minimal window prior to first frost and still provide the benefits of a cover crop. The combination may be planted up until mid October in Zone 5, late October in Zone 6. It will loosen topsoil, protect your soil from winter erosion and nutrient loss, suppress weeds and provide mulch in the spring and food for soil micro and macro organisms which are crucial for healthy soil. Includes: Cereal Rye, Oilseed Radish, Hairy Vetch and Crimson Clover. A one pound bag will seed 200-300 square feet.

Austrian Winter Pea:

A quick growing, excellent source of Nitrogen which provides very good erosion control and breaks down quickly. Winter peas are also very good at loosening topsoil and reducing weeds and disease. Succulent stems break down easily. Added bacterial inoculant will maximize nitrogen fixation. Field peas grow rapidly in the cool, moist weather, and can be sown in late fall to come up quickly in early spring. Spring flowers provide nectar for pollinators, and shoots are edible in salads. A one pound bag will seed 200-300 square ft.

The Lucas Soil & Water Conservation District is offering new and established pond owners the opportunity to stock their ponds conveniently and at a low cost. Anyone considering stocking their pond in the near future should take advantage of this opportunity.

An aerator tank truck from Fender's Fish Hatchery in Baltic, Ohio, will distribute fish fingerlings on TUESDAY, OCTOBER 17, 2017, from 10:30 AM to 11:30 AM at our office in Maumee.

Bring your own container lined with a clean trash bag <u>half-filled</u> with your <u>pond water</u>. The container should be prepped as close to pick up time as possible to prevent drastic temperature changes in the water which can cause shock to your fish during transportation. A 5-gallon bucket is adequate for 50 fish or 1,000 minnows.

Fish are guaranteed to be delivered in good condition, however, we cannot guarantee survival after stocking in your pond.
