She continues to serve Partners for Clean Streams as a Planning Team Member, Coordinator of the Ottawa Park Kickoff and Challenge Coordinator for Clean Your Streams, which has grown to involve more than 1000 volunteers. Marilyn is also a founding member of the Rain Garden Initiative of Toledo-Lucas County (RGI) and continues to serve on its Public Outreach and Education Committee. She is privileged to be among the RGI partners working on its current outreach project, the development of a day camp curriculum, the Junior Watershed Academy, funded by a GM Powertrain Plant City Grant.
