



Conifers - Bareroot Seedlings



Norway Spruce Picea abies \$20.00 per 25-pack Approx. 12-18" Seedlings

A large tree with dark green foliage and heavy spreading branches. Needles are short. Grows moderate to fast, reaching 35 ft. in 20 years. Grows well in most soil and drainage conditions. Height 40-60 ft. at maturity and 25-30 ft. in spread.



Douglas Fir
Pseudotsuga menziesii glauca
\$22.00 per 25-pack
Approx. 18-24" Seedlings

Although not a true fir, this evergreen is beautiful alone or used in a group as a screen. Grows 40-80 ft. tall and is moderate to slow growing. Does best in well-drained soils and full sun.

Windbreak Special!

100 Norway Spruce Seedlings for \$70.00

Windbreaks are a conservation practice that protect topsoil from erosion, as well as protect homes or structures from cold or damaging winds. Norway Spruce are a common tree used for this practice. Contact our office and ask about renting our tree planter! (419) 893-1966



Green Rocket Hybrid Cedar Thuja plicata x \$15.00 per approx. 18-30" tree

Fast growing, up to 3 ft./year! A white-tail deer resistant Arborvitae hybrid with nice cedar-like aroma. Stays green longer than other Arbs in winter. Tolerates most soil conditions. Up to 25 ft. tall by 6-10 ft. wide.

Hardwoods - 3 gallon pots



Serviceberry Amelanchier laevis \$30.00 per tree (approx. 4-5')

Also known as Juneberry. Edible berries are a good substitute for blueberries in alkaline soils. Can be grown as a small tree or large suckering shrub, loaded with white flowers in the spring followed by red/purple fruit in summer. Birds love this tree! Mature height is 15-25 ft.



Sycamore Platanus occidentalis \$30.00 per tree (approx. 5-6')

This fast-growing native tree reaches 20 ft. in 5-8 years, and up to 100 ft. at maturity. Lovely flaking white-green-brown bark adds interest year-round. Terrific shade tree that grows well in most soils and tolerates flooding. Attracts many birds, insect pollinators and small mammals.



Eastern Redbud Cercis canadensis \$30.00 per tree (approx. 4-5')

A small tree forming a graceful, rounded crown. Lavender pink flowers come in April followed by lovely heart-shaped leaves and small bean pods. Bright yellow fall leaf color, this makes for a nice landscape tree. Grows to 15-30 ft. in height by a similar spread.



Bur Oak Quercus macrocarpa \$30.00 per tree (approx. 5-6')

This native tree can grow up to 90 ft. tall by almost as wide. It has large leaves and acorns with "fuzzy" caps. A member of the White Oak family, these trees are of great value to wildlife! They typically live for more than 300 years and can tolerate many soil types and conditions. Require full sun.

Shrubs - Bareroot Seedlings



Red-twig Dogwood Cornus sericea (\$10.00 per 5-pack) A showy native shrub with white summer flowers, clusters of small white berries, bright fall foliage and attractive red winter bark. It has excellent nectar and wildlife benefits. Reaches a height of 5-15 ft. with similar width. Fast-growing, adaptable to most soils. Good hedge or windbreak plant. It is very moisture tolerant.



Silky Willow Salix sericea (\$10.00 per 5-pack) Like other Willows, this native shrub thrives in moist/wet soils and can help control erosion along a waterway. Beautiful gray catkins with yellow tips bloom March - April before silvery green leaves emerge, providing important early food for pollinators. Grows quickly, reaching up to 12 ft.



Sweet Shrub Calycanthus floridus (\$10.00 per 5-pack) Also known as Carolina Allspice, this native shrub has glossy, darkgreen, aromatic leaves and reddishmaroon flowers. It has yellow fall foliage and reaches 6-9 ft. in height. It is very adaptable to many soil, water and light conditions. Drought tolerant. Prune immediately after flowering to keep shape.

Smooth Rose Rosa blanda (\$10.00 per 5-pack) Also known as Meadow Rose, it is a nearly thorn-less native rose that spreads underground via rhizomes. Grows to 3-5 ft. in a mounded shape. Beautiful, fragrant pink flowers and rosehip fruits attract pollinating insects, birds, and other wildlife. Prefers dry to medium soil and full to part-sun.



Steeplebush Spirea tomentosa (\$10.00 per 5-pack) This upright, multistemmed native shrub is known for its spires of showy pick flowers and reddishgold foliage in autumn. It prefers moist growing conditions and full-sun but can tolerate some shade. Attracts butterflies! Grows 3-4 ft. in height with a slightly larger width. Member of the Rose family.

Native Prairie Seed Packets - \$10 each

Our 1-ounce seed packets cover approximately 250 square feet (about 12' by 20'). They are a mix of prairie flowers and grasses genetically native to our region. Good for naturalizing small areas, or for use as transplants for landscaping! Two mixes are being offered for \$10 each -- a dry mix suitable for sandy, well-drained soils and a moist mix suited for average to wet soils.



Planning your Vegetable Garden By: Penny Bollin, Urban Conservation Technician



DEVELOP A LIST OF PLANTS YOU WANT: It is important to first review your garden diary or notes from last year to be reminded of what plants did well. Now is the time to look through seed catalogues for other inspiration. Then, whittle down your list based on your actual space. We all fall guilty of planting too many plants in our gardens sometimes...

PLANNING YOUR BED: There are two methods for organizing your garden; the square-foot method or traditional row gardening. The square-foot method allows for 1 square-foot of space per plant, so your garden ends up looking like a grid rather than rows. The seed catalogues will tell you the spacing as does the back of your seed packets. You can use a free (or paid for) online garden planner or use graph paper, a pencil, and a ruler to plan out your garden. Keep in mind that taller plants can possibly shade out smaller ones. For example, if they are on the south-side, they will cast shade on your garden for most of the day. Also, if you are going to grow plants that need support, decide what you will use based on plant size.

GETTING YOUR PLANTS/SEEDS: Make a list that includes the seeds you still have, what plants you think your local greenhouse will have, and which seeds you will purchase from catalogues. Keep in mind that local greenhouses tend to have the basics. So, if you want an uncommon variety, you should consider ordering those from a seed catalogue.

A FEW REMINDERS BEFORE SPRING: Return to your plan and compare your diagram to your list. Is anything missing? It is also a good idea to look at your property to identify extra spots (including pots) to stuff the bonus plants you know you will have. Consult an online planting calculator for your zone (the Toledo area is in Planting Zone 6). Use this calculator to determine which plants to start indoors, when to start them, and when to plant seeds or transplants outside.

Spring Fish Sale - Orders due May 9th (mail-in orders no longer accepted)

An aerator truck from Fender's Fish Hatchery will distribute pre-ordered live fish fingerlings (juvenile fish) on Thursday, May 16, 2024 from 10:30 - 11:30 AM at the Lucas County Fairgrounds in Maumee, Ohio. Each customer MUST bring their own container(s) to transport the fish home in. Each container MUST be lined with an unscented plastic bag (at least 10-gallon capacity) and half-filled with water from the pond. One container per 100 small fish or 1,000 minnows.



Spring Cover Crop Sale - Orders due March 29th (mail-in orders no longer accepted)



We are offering four cover crop seed mixes this spring for use in your garden later this year that are well-suited for NW Ohio. Planting a cover crop in areas that are otherwise left barren protects your soil and also rejuvenates the soil and improves water infiltration. Mixes will be ready for pick-up either during Tree Sale Pick-up on <u>April 22-23</u> at the <u>Lucas County Fairgrounds</u> in Maumee or after the 23rd at our office in Toledo.

1-lb. Cover Crop Mixes: \$7.50 per bag plus sales tax (cover 200-300 sq. ft.)

Summer Mix: a complex mix designed to rejuvenate and protect fallow ground through the summer for planting of late, cool season vegetables or fall cover crop. Plant after last frost or when soil is above 65F.

Color & Cover Mix: this mix is designed for maximum improvement in soil health and nutrient cycling. Plant August through mid-September. Can be planted around warm season vegetables.

Raised Bed Mix: this mix is designed to provide diverse root structures and organic matter to fortify and amend depleted soils. Attracts pollinators and beneficial insects! Plant August through mid-September.

Buckwheat: is a broadleaf, short-season cover crop that establishes, blooms, and reaches maturity in 70-90 days. Attracts pollinators with its white blooms and suppresses weeds. Plant through summer as needed.

Farmland Preservation

With the increasing pressure of farmland to be converted to residential and commercial developments, the Lucas SWCD is committed to keep farming in our area viable and our food sources local. We are proud to announce that the Lucas SWCD is now a Local Sponsor of ODA's Local Agricultural Easement Purchase Program (LAEPP). This program offers agricultural landowners a financial incentive of \$2,000 per acre for establishing an agricultural easement on their property. The easement establishes that the piece of property will forever be used for agriculture and no development can occur on the site. The application period for this round of funding is open until April 18th. Additionally, through a partnership with the American Farmland Trust, we are able to offer 'mini-grants' of up to \$4,000 to help offset the landowner's cost of establishing an agricultural easement, such as legal, realtor, or title fees. H2Ohio

For crop year 2023, over 11,250 acres were enrolled in H2Ohio through the Lucas SWCD, with the year's total cost-share payment to area farmers reaching nearly \$190K! See below for a break-down of the 2023 numbers. (Note that numbers for 2023 are skewed compared to previous years as some practices and acres have been rolled over into the new version of the H2Ohio program). The new iteration of the H2Ohio program is underway, with participants currently working on their nutrient management plans and enrolling practices for 2024 and 2025.

Interested farmers who have not yet signed up are encouraged to contact the Lucas SWCD and get registered, as ODA will continue to accept contracts as funds allow on a first-come, first-serve basis.

- Tree and brush disposal: Ballard and Bench/Hagerman
- Bottom dip-out: Householder
